





What began in 2021 with just six children in a small rented building at Coco Beach has today blossomed into the St. Elizabeth Upendo Rehabilitation Centre in Mdengaa sanctuary of hope for children with autism, physical disabilities, and vulnerable backgrounds.

The journey was never easy. In 2022, with help from kind donors, the Centre built its first classrooms and moved to Magomeni. A year later, Madam Christina met Abbot Christian Temu, whose support opened doors to the Abbey of Münsterschwarzach under Br. Abraham. Their generosity brought classrooms and dormitories, expanding the vision.

Then came Mr. Friedel Werner, whose heart was moved by the mission. With encouragement from Abbot Christian, he proposed shifting the Centre to Mdenga, where there was space to grow. The chosen site-once a kindergarten built in memory of Mr. Werner's late sister-was given new life with the blessing of Bishop Titus Mdoe. By September 2024, renovations were underway, and on August 22, 2025, the dream became reality: the inauguration of the new Upendo Centre.

From six children to 50 today, supported by 13 dedicated staff, Upendo has not only cared for children but also created jobs, spread awareness about autism, touched lives through acts of giving, and even reached children across Tanzania through social media. Parents once in despair have found hope, knowing their children are safe, loved, and cared for.

Challenges remain-there is still need for physiotherapists, special education teachers, and stronger medical support. Yet, the story of Upendo is proof that love, faith, and community can build miracles. To the Government of Mtwara, the Catholic Church, Abbot Christian, Br. Abraham, Mr. Werner, and the donors of Kinderhilfe Tanzania, the Centre's children shine today because of you.

Here at Mdenga, every smile tells the story: when love leads, lives are transformed.

Inside the quiet of a simple eggshell, a miracle unfolds—a story of patience few ever pause to see. For twenty-one days, a mother hen sits faithfully, warming what looks like nothing more than fragile shells. She does not wander far, she eats sparingly, she keeps vigil—day and night—because life is forming where eyes cannot see.

On the first days, nothing seems to change. To the outside world, the eggs remain still, silent. But within, cells are dividing, a heart is forming, tiny veins begin to carry the rhythm of life. By day 7, if one could look closely, a small beak and eyes are shaping. By day 14, feathers whisper into being. By day 18, the chick is almost ready, folded perfectly within the shell that once seemed so empty.

The hen never doubts. She does not crack the shells to check. She believes. She waits. She trusts the unseen. And then, on the 21st day, the miracle breaks forth—a tiny beak pierces the shell, the first breath is drawn, and the silent waiting is crowned with the music of life.

The story of the chicken teaches us that growth requires patience, discipline, and unshakable belief. Just because we do not see progress does not mean nothing is happening. Great things often take time, and the most beautiful transforma-tions happen in silence, hidden from sight, until the right moment comes.

So, wait like the hen-faithful, patient, unwavering. For when the time is right, the miracle within you will break forth too.
